







REPORT TO THE COMMUNITY BY LAWRENCE S. BLOOMBERG & JOSEPH MAPA

FINANCE

For fiscal 2004, we operated with a total budget of \$352 million, comprised of \$296 million for Hospital operations and \$56 million for the Samuel Lunenfeld Research Institute. This budget represents an increase of 13 percent over the previous year, reflecting increased government funding for the Hospital's core operating requirements, one-time funding to offset the impact of SARS, expanded clinical programs and the continued success of the Samuel Lunenfeld Research Institute to attract competitive external peer review grants. Even though the year began with the outbreak of SARS and disruption of services, we recovered in a short period of time, resuming our full spectrum of services. During fiscal 2004, we admitted 24,784 patients, performed 17,294 surgeries, delivered 6,966 babies, provided ambulatory services to 587,300 patients and cared for 34,064 patients in our Emergency Department.

We finished the year with a small surplus, our bank debt did not change, and we continued to manage in a cost-effective manner. Mount Sinai Hospital has one of the lowest overhead costs among teaching hospitals (22%). Recent available data show that once again our Hospital's actual cost per weighted case is below expected (approximately 2% below). Clinical trends show that Mount Sinai Hospital has managed to decrease its length of stay (from 5.5 to 5.3 days), yet has improved quality at the same time

by reducing its readmission rate to hospital to an extremely low 0.9% of cases.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT

Community and philanthropic support is key in differentiating Mount Sinai Hospital. Hand-in-hand with our Foundation, Hospital Auxiliary and Leadership Sinai, we generated over \$22 million in fund raising revenue and investment income in fiscal 2004. This sets the stage for the launch of Phase 2 of *The Best Medicine* campaign with a major focus on capital renewal to upgrade our facilities, acquisition of a new generation of technologies, and establishment of endowed chairs to recruit and retain leading practitioners. These funds also support the core infrastructure of our world-renowned Samuel Lunenfeld Research Institute. Every dollar contributed by our community for research has leveraged \$11 in government/industry peer reviewed grants.

An essential part of our community support comes from over 3,000 dedicated volunteers including members of our Board, Hospital Auxiliary, Leadership Sinai and the many volunteers who give so generously of their time through our Volunteer Services. Volunteer Services boasts 657 volunteers, who this past year contributed 70,000 hours of volunteer services in over 125 programs throughout the Hospital.

We are steadfast in our resolve to deliver The Best Medicine which is built on our foundation of world-class research and education.

GOVERNMENT

We have been working with government in advancing its transformational agenda. The new government in Ontario began by laying out the game plan for the future of health care in this province with strong emphasis on reduced waiting times, accountability agreements, primary care, move to full time nursing, integrated service provider models, and fiduciary responsibility. We continue to play an active role on TAHSC (Toronto Academic Health Science Centre) which is composed of the Toronto teaching hospitals and the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Toronto. The teaching hospitals are examining opportunities for potential cost savings for both the hospitals and the overall health care system in such areas as laboratory services and information technology. At the specific request of government and with their financial support in fiscal 2004, we have increased the number of cancer surgeries performed in our Hospital by 475, to reduce patient waiting times. The province is drawing upon the experience and skills of many of our clinical and management leaders to provide advice on its agenda, especially with regard to co-ordinated service delivery. We are also looking at opportunities to further integrate and collaborate to strengthen our programs and identity.

CLINICAL CARE

We are steadfast in our resolve to deliver *The Best Medicine* which is built on our foundation of world-class research and education. We have great clinicians providing leading-edge care. We are recognized for compassionate care. We serve as a provincial resource in a number of areas, and we strive to be the best we can. To ensure that we stay at the leading-edge in clinical care, teaching and research, our focus is increasingly on genomic medicine, the emerging future of medical care. To optimize the diagnosis and care of individual patients, it is essential to apply the understanding of genetic research and advanced technology to the genetic makeup of patients and their families.

We continue to offer world-class care for common chronic adult diseases such as diabetes, heart failure, arthritis, mental illness and digestive diseases. We build upon this excellence to offer subspecialized programs to the region and the province in infectious disease, emergency care, orthopaedics, perinatology and neonatology, specialized cancer surgery, genetics and critical care. This past year we assumed the role as a provincial resource for Oral and Maxillofacial dental surgery – the only program of its kind in Ontario. Each of these programs is informed by developments in genomic medicine.



For example, Dr. Steven Gallinger, one of our leading surgical oncologists, was the lead author in a ground-breaking study that shows that a simple genetic test can determine if chemotherapy is likely to be effective in treating a patient's colon cancer, the second leading cause of cancer deaths in North America. Dr. Kathy Siminovitch was the lead researcher in a study that has isolated a gene that, if it malfunctions, puts people at greater risk of developing Crohn's disease. Dr. Ed Keystone and his colleagues are working to identify the genes that determine susceptibility to rheumatoid arthritis. The Familial Gastrointestinal Cancer registry in our Department of Surgery tracks the history and trends in families with genetic pre-dispositions. Genetic counselling will also be an important component of our proposed new Primary Care and Wellness Centre in York Region as part of the Jewish Toronto Tomorrow initiative, bringing us closer to our community. Our broader vision is to create a new Centre for Clinical Genetics to support all of our clinical programs.

TEACHING

Our affiliation with the University of Toronto continues to thrive. The University's Surgical Skills Laboratory, located at Mount Sinai Hospital, is a unique training facility for medical students and residents both locally and from around the world. We train 115 undergraduate medical students and 225 postgraduate medical students annually as part of our role as a leading academic centre of the Faculty of Medicine. We also provide continuing education to clinicians from across the province. For example, Dr. June Carroll heads a program that educates family physicians on recent developments in genomic medicine which they can incorporate into their daily practice.

RESEARCH

Our Research Institute continues to excel. We have initiated the multi-hospital Toronto Centre for Phenogenomics – a \$65 million human modeling facility to be housed on the Joseph and Wolf Lebovic Building campus. On March 8, 2004, we were successful in a Canada Foundation for Innovation competition in which we were awarded \$6.5 million for equipment and infrastructure to support our vision for the expansion of our Samuel Lunenfeld Research Institute. We are hopeful that the balance of capital and operating funds will be raised so that we can create a new Centre for Systems Biology and Genomic Medicine focused on fundamental research and its application to our clinical centres of excellence. Drs. Tony Pawson and Janet Rossant and their teams continue to be recognized as world leaders in biomedical research. Dr. Pawson was elected to the prestigious U.S. Academy of Sciences and Dr. Janet Rossant was awarded the Killam Prize from the Canada Council.

This year marked the 50th Anniversary of Mount Sinai Hospital Auxiliary and the 10th Anniversary of Leadership Sinai. These are not only milestones of time, but milestones of accomplishment and consistent support of our Hospital. We are grateful to all of you.




